
It's less hello and more 'welcome back' for Laura Gallagher! She returns from maternity leave as Network Manager and is looking forward to working with you all on new and existing projects.




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Repatriations

Research & NELETN

REBOA

Each year around 5400 people in England and Wales die after being severely injured – for example, in a road traffic collision, or as a result of a major fall. The leading cause of preventable death following injury is uncontrolled bleeding, which usually requires immediate surgery. However, some patients die before they can reach an operating theatre. The use of tourniquets has been shown to improve survival, by stopping bleeding before surgery, during the recent conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. Tourniquets are effective at stop-

ping bleeding from the extremities but are no use when the bleeding is inside the torso.

REBOA (which stands for Resuscitative Endovascular Balloon Occlusion of the Aorta) is a new technique which could help with this. REBOA involves passing a small inflatable balloon into the aorta (the main artery in the body) to stop the bleeding until a patient can be taken to an operating theatre. While REBOA has shown early promise we do not yet know whether it is better than the standard care given to trauma patients. This study aims to com-

pare standard major trauma centre care with REBOA versus standard major trauma care alone, in a fair and balanced way. A large multi-disciplinary team of clinicians and researchers are involved in caring for these patients and running the trial. The team involves surgeons, emergency medicine doctors, anaesthetists, intensive care doctors, nurses and clinical research fellows. Dr Samy Sadek is the Principle Investigator and is supported by Professor Karim Brohi and Colonel Nigel Tai.

PELoTS

The Paediatric Evaluation of the London Trauma System launched on 1st February and we are proud to say that NELETN was the first network to have all of its Trauma Units signed up to the study. The aim is to determine the quality, inclusiveness and
